Following the authorization of the twenty-fourth convention, assembled at Bigwin Inn, Lake of Bays, Ontario, your "CC" has taken steps to cope with the ever growing demands of the fraternity, and has appointed an additional member of the secretarial staff of Delta Chi. The new appointee will become field secretary and assistant to the "CC" in the head office of the organization.

In order to relieve Robert T. Mason, for four years Editor of *The Delta Chi Quarterly*, of the ever-growing press of business caused by his work with *The Iron Trade Review*, the Executive Board has designated the field secretary appointed by the "CC" as Editor, and he will take over his new duties at once.

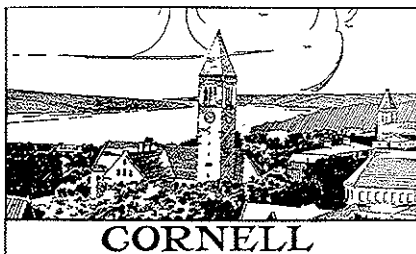
This action was taken by the Executive Board and the "CC," after serious consideration of the needs, possibilities and obligations of the fraternity, discussed at length in New York during the Thanksgiving holidays, while most of the members of the board were attending the Interfraternity Conference.

These steps were taken to place in the organization a full time worker whose duty it will be to visit all of the chapters of Delta Chi and to co-operate with active men and alumni in furthering the ideals, ideas, and aspirations of the organization, and in coping with the countless vexatious problems and questions that constantly confront fraternity men.

The action taken decidedly widens the possibilities for efficient conduct of the business of the fraternity. It opens up to individuals, both in and out of college, and to chapters, large opportunities for improving all phases of their fraternity relations and life. A full time man, in constant and close touch with the central office in Iowa City, combining his field and office work with the task of editing *The Quarterly*, ought necessarily to soon become invaluable as a link between headquarters and each chapter.

As the "CC" of your organization, let me stress the importance in connection with the new experiment, of striving in the spirit of fraternity, intelligence, and understanding, and of bearing always in mind the results that can be derived by heartily working in unison,—to the permanent benefit of Delta Chi.

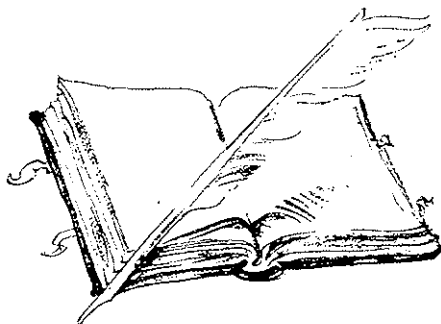

The New Editor

FOR FOUR YEARS Associate Editor, Albert S. Tousey, who has been chosen by the Executive Board to succeed "Bob" Mason, brings to *The Delta Chi Quarterly* a background of magazine and newspaper experience.

Son of a newspaperman, and grandson of a newspaperman, he was a journalist almost from the cradle. His first journalistic efforts were pecking away at a typewriter as office boy while working his way through high school on the *St. Paul Pioneer Press*. Later, while still in high school he became cub reporter on the same paper, and then conducted a high school sports column for *The St. Paul Daily News*.

During his college course at the University of Minnesota, he worked his way through school on the *St. Paul Pioneer Press*, and in both St. Paul and Minneapolis offices of the *Associated Press*



He was for four years a member of the staff of *The Minnesota Daily*, student newspaper, and Managing Editor during his senior year. He was for two years on the

staff of *Ski-U-Mah*, and in his junior year, Editor-in-Chief. He also was a member of the staffs of the *Gopher*, class annual, and the *Alumni Weekly* of the University of Minnesota.

Since graduation from the university, he has edited a country weekly, and worked on the editorial departments of *The Minneapolis Journal*, *New Orleans Item-Tribune*, *New Orleans Times-Picayune*, and the *Milwaukee Sentinel*.

Several of his articles have appeared in *The Delta Chi Quarterly* since he won one of the "E's" keys in 1923, and beginning with the March number he will have complete charge of the editorial destinies of your fraternity publication.
